The National Emergency Services Memorial (NESM) is a Registered Charity in England and Wales (1187751) and Scotland (SC048678) and is raising at least £3.2 million to build Britain's first national memorial dedicated to ALL emergency services personnel and service animals.

The 999 Cenotaph will act as a national symbol of remembrance, gratitude and sacrifice to the incredible men, women and service animals. **Over two million personnel** - many of whom are volunteers - currently work across the emergency services - from Belfast to Cardiff to Edinburgh and London, their selfless work is admirable.

More than **7,500** members of the emergency services who have tragically lost their lives in the course of their duties, and many hundreds more have died travelling to and from their **999** duties.

In addition to creating a 999 Cenotaph, we also organise the UK's annual Emergency Services Festival of Thanksgiving.

The 999 Festival is an annual event which takes place on the nearest Friday to 999 Day (9th September). It brings together senior politicians, emergency services and the public to show their united appreciation to those who work in the NHS and emergency services.

We are very proud to have the support of HRH The Duke of Cambridge, the Prime Minister, First Ministers and many other emergency services, politicians and supporters.
